From the Chair Jane Ellen Smith, Ph.D.



This is the 5th issue of the new and improved Psychology Department newsletter—and the fourth one since I became chair of the department four years ago. The purpose of the newsletter is to improve communication between the current Psychology Department members

(faculty, students, staff) and all of the people who have been an important part of the department in one way or another in the past. We welcome information from you to share. Contact Esther: etgold-en@unm.edu or Kim: klarran@unm.edu with your news. Specify that it is for the newsletter.

Undergraduate Education: We continue to grow in terms of undergraduate psychology majors. In 1996 we had 775 declared majors, and this year we had over **1700 majors**. A total of 379 bachelor's degrees in psychology were awarded. We offered a total of **40 online courses** last year!

Graduate Education: We have **75** graduate students in four main concentrations: Clinical; Cognition, Brain, & Behavior; Evolutionary/Developmental; and Health. The students had 86 publications this year. We received 244 applications to our graduate program, and we admitted a class of 12.

Faculty: The department was granted permission to do a search for a health psychologist. Dr. Kevin Vowles accepted our offer and joined us this Fall. We also had Dr. Katie Witkiewitz, an individual in the addictions area (a hire from the previous year), join our faculty this Fall. Overall, the faculty are doing very well! Although we had only 24 FTEs (a total of 25 voting faculty), as a department we published 131 articles, books, or book chapters last year. Depending on how you calculate it, that's an average of more than 5 publications per faculty. Furthermore, we generated almost \$8 million in research funding.

NEW UNM President Dr. Robert Frank—UNM Psychology Department Alumnus



Dr. Frank is the 21st President of UNM. He came to us from Kent State University, where he served as Provost and Sr. Vice President for Academic Affairs. Prior to that he was dean of the College of Public Health and Health Professions at the University of Florida. In 2011, Dr. Frank was appointed by the U. S. Department of Defense to the Defense Health Board, a federal advisory committee to the Secretary of Defense.

Why is Dr. Frank so special to us? He holds a doctorate in clinical psychology - from *here*. Not only did he work with our retired faculty member Dr. John Gluck, but Dr. Frank was John's first PhD student! Dr. Frank is a Diplomate in Clinical Psychology from the American Board of Professional Psychology. He was a Robert Wood Johnson Health Policy Fellow serving in the office of Senator Jeff Bingaman. Dr. Frank is past president of the Division of Rehabilitation Psychology of the American Psychological Association. He also is a Fellow in Rehabilitation Psychology, Clinical Psychology, and Health Psychology. Dr. Frank's scholarship focuses on the areas of psychological adjustment to catastrophic injury and health policy.

New Faculty Hires

Dr. Kevin Vowles



Dr. Vowles was hired as an Assistant Professor and joined the Department in August 2012. He received his PhD from West Virginia University in 2004 and worked abroad in the United Kingdom from 2005-2012. Kevin is a member of both the Health Psychology and Clinical areas. His research to date has examined psychological processes in chronic pain, particularly those that can be helped through psychological intervention. Kevin's work in this area has been cited by the Society of Clinical Psychology (Division 12 of the American Psychological Association) as evidence providing "strong" research support for psychological interventions for chronic pain. Kevin's wife, Janet, and daughter, Kaidyn, accompanied him in his move back to the US. The entire family is enjoying the varied cultures and landscape of New Mexico, as well as the consistent sunshine.

Dr. Katie Witkiewitz



Dr. Witkiewitz was hired as a tenured Associate Professor in the summer of 2011, but she started in the department in August 2012. She received her Ph.D. from the University of Washington in 2005. Her research focuses on studying the process of addictive behavior relapse and scientifically-supported treatments for addiction. These efforts have led to several empirical investigations on the mechanisms of successful addiction treatment outcomes, as well as the development of interventions to prevent addictive behavior relapse. The interventions include mindfulness based relapse prevention and group based relapse prevention. Katie is teaching an advanced statistics class for graduate students this semester.

New Senior Research Scientist: Dr. Teddy Warner



Dr. Warner is a Research Associate Professor in Family and Community Medicine, and has been an Adjunct Associate Professor in Psychology since 2005. Although he has taught various courses for us over the past decade, this fall he began teaching a normal 2/2 load in Psychology. He is a social psychologist with expertise in organizational behavior, research design, quantitative and qualitative data analyses, survey research, and psychometrics. He also teaches clinical research measurement and research ethics at the Clinical Translational Science Center, where he is an ethicist and core bio-statistical faculty member. He recently directed a 5-year NIMH/NHGRI study of ethical, legal, and social issues in psychiatric genetic research, and has begun collaboration on a funded multi-site 5-year NCI study of the Effects of Pre-Analytic Variables on Bio-Specimen Quality. As one of 3 UNM project Co-PIs, he is waiting to hear about funding of a 5-year NHGRI/NCI study of whole genome testing.

Clinical Neuroscience Center Program Coordinator



Kathy Deeshchii'nii is Dine, from the great Navajo Nation. She is from the Bitter Water Clan (Maternal) born for the Hairy People (Paternal Clan). 


New Clinical Neuroscience Center

The remodel of 9,363 square feet of the second floor of Logan Hall was completed this summer. This Clinical Neuroscience Center (CNC) was the result of an NIH grant for almost \$5 million. The PIs were Jane Ellen Smith (Psychology) and William Turner (UNM's Office of Capital Projects). The CNC contains renovated clinical neuroscience labs (Pediatric and Adult EEG, Transcranial Stimulation), imaging and data analysis centers with high-speed IT links to collaborating institutions such as the Mind Research Network (MRN), individual and group testing rooms, collaborative/computerized work areas, graduate student offices, and secure data storage. Importantly, the CNC will support the integration of MRN's neuroimaging and genetic data with CNC data, thereby offering researchers access to vast amounts of shared data across studies, modalities, sites, and disciplines. This remodeled area also contains a new Logan Library, which has the capability to be used as seminar room as well. Vince Clark is serving as the first director of the CNC.

While the CNC certainly will allow us to enhance our neuroscience research capabilities, at the same time it will be an ideal training ground for both our graduate and undergraduate students. Specialists have been brought in to train students on several of the new pieces of equipment, and faculty are offering courses to continue the training. Students have been learning how to use the three EEG systems to record brainwaves, and the transcranial magnetic stimulation system to influence brain activity. Together these resources will help us train our students to use these technologies to understand the functioning of the healthy human brain, and ultimately to diagnose and treat mental illness.

Dr. William Miller: Where Is He Now?



I've been retired for six years now and people still ask me, "Are you really retired?" I guess it depends on what you mean by "retired." I'm not sitting in a rocker watching TV, but I certainly do have a new life without grants to propose and manage, students and employees to support, classes to teach, deadlines to meet, administration and faculty meetings, or trips to DC. I retired my psychology license and my membership in professional associations, and I'm not doing research consulting. My blood pressure and cholesterol went down to normal, and most days when I wake up (later than before) I think, "What would I like to do today?" We spend time with our children and grandchildren, all of whom live in New Mexico.

Writing remains a creative pleasure for me, and I've continued to do a book a year, most recently new editions of *Motivational Interviewing* (with Steve Rollnick) and *Controlling Your Drinking* (with Ricardo Muñoz). Bob Meyers and I are developing a self-help interactive journal for veterans returning from combat. Music has always been a joy for me, and now I have time to write more complex music, particularly choral composition. I've written a Christmas cantata, an Easter cantata, and a variety of anthems for the church choir in which Kathy and I sing. I've also set some favorite Robert Frost and Carl Sandburg texts for chorus.

Four years ago I was ordained as a deacon (those who provide pastoral care within the Presbyterian church), and I have been active in ministry with the homeless who worship with us. I have had the time and, with this ordination, the responsibility to follow the example of Jesus to serve the poor and suffering. We hope that the Jackson-Miller endowment will continue to enable and inspire graduate students to work with the poorest of the poor, which enriches both the server and the served.

Kathy and I have also been doing quite a bit of traveling. I thought that invitations to speak would diminish when I retired, but the opposite has happened. We lived in Odense, Denmark for two months last year while I was a visiting professor at the University of Southern Denmark. Motivational interviewing continues to disseminate at a surprising rate, now in at least 45 languages, and in early 2013 I will be doing some training for the first time in China, Korea and Japan.

I thoroughly enjoyed my life and career in academia, and now I am loving a new chapter. UNM was a great place to learn and grow; I came to the Psychology Department in 1976 and never left, retiring from my first job. 
